

The S. C. Human Affairs Commission is a State Agency dedicated to providing and promoting diversity, equal and fair rights for all citizens in regards to race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin, or disability across the State of South Carolina in employment, housing, and public accommodations. The legendary Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was a phenomenal leader during the civil rights movement who



will be remembered for a lifetime. Dr. King's powerful speeches touched the lives of millions during such a time where segregation and inequality were part of daily life.

In Columbia, the 2019 King Day at the Dome event began at the historic Zion Baptist Church, followed by a march to the Statehouse.

The University of South Carolina held an event titled "Freedom Rings," emceed by local radio announcer Tre Tailor and Wally "Famous" Amos. This year's event included excerpts from Dr. King's "The Beloved Community" speech and performances by USC's gospel choir *A Touch of Faith*, gospel recording artist John Lakin, Christian rap artist Big Redd, and many others.

The City of Rock Hill Community Relations Council held a Martin Luther King, Jr., Day Interfaith Prayer Breakfast. Rev. C. T. Kirk accepted the Dream Keeper Award during the 16th annual Martin Luther King, Jr., Interfaith Prayer Breakfast at First Baptist Church Rock Hill. The World Interfaith Harmony Week Annual UN Observance Week: Feb. 1-7

The World Interfaith Harmony Week is based on the pioneering work of The Common Word initiative. This initiative, which started in 2007, called for Muslim and Christian leaders to engage in a dialogue based on two common fundamental religious commandments; Love of God, and Love of the Neighbour, without nevertheless compromising any of their own religious tenets. The two commandments are at the heart of the three monotheistic religions and therefore provide the most solid theological ground possible.

The World Interfaith Harmony Week renders the two commandments as 'Love of the Good, and Love of the Neighbour'. This formula includes all people of goodwill. It includes those of other faiths, and those with no faith.

The World Interfaith Harmony Week provides a platform—one week in a year—when all interfaith groups and other groups of goodwill can show the world what a powerful movement they are. The thousands of events organized by these groups often go unnoticed not only by the general public, but also by other groups themselves. This week will allow for these groups to become aware of each other and strengthen the movement by building ties and avoiding duplicating each other's efforts.

It is hoped that this initiative will provide a focal point from which all people of goodwill can recognize that the common values they hold far outweigh the differences they have, and thus provide a strong dosage of peace and harmony to their communities. Annual Event Calendar
