We celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month, whose roots go back to 1968, by recognizing the contributions made and the important presence of Hispanic and Latino Americans to the United States. We also celebrate this special heritage and culture during this time.

The term Hispanic or Latino, refers to Puerto Rican, South or Central American, and other Spanish cultures or origins regardless of race.

September 15th is the anniversary of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua's independence. Mexico, Chile, and Belize share their independence during this month as well. Columbus Day (Dia de la Raza) is the second Monday in October.

Today nearly 58 million people, or 18% of Americans, are of Hispanic or Latino origin and another 3.3 million are residents of Puerto Rico, a U.S. territory.

Did you know?

Franklin Ramón Chang Díaz was born in

San José, Costa Rica on April 5, 1950. Franklin's NASA career began in 1980 when he was selected as a candidate to become an astronaut. He made his first trip aboard a apace shuttle in 1986 and went on six more



missions between 1989 and 2002. Starting in 1993, he served as the director for the Advanced Space Propulsion Laboratory at the Johnson Space Center until his retirement in 2005. Currently, he is an Adjunct Professor in Physics and Astronomy at Rice University.



Baruj Benacerraf was a Venezuelan-American immunologist, who shared the 1980 Nobel Prize in Physiology or

Medicine for the discovery of the major histocompatibility complex genes. Benacerraf was born in Caracas, Venezuela in 1920. He and his family moved to Paris from Venezuela in 1925. and later the U.S. in 1940. In 1942, he earned his Bachelor of Science degree at Columbia University, and went on to obtain his Doctor of Medicine degree from the Medical College of Virginia. He has authored over 300 books and articles.
